SIMPLIFIED ONLINE JURY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM BEING ROLLED OUT TO COURTS ACROSS THE STATE

Wyoming Supreme Court Chief Justice Michael K. Davis is pleased to report that the new jury management system (AgileJury) is now in use in the Laramie County and Platte County circuit and district courts.

The system has received strong praise and has been used by over five thousand citizens in Laramie County since its pilot last March. AgileJury simplifies jury management and lessens the time, effort and administrative costs associated with the jury process. It has significantly reduced the amount of time the court clerks spend notifying jurors when to report to court, which is a task that can now be accomplished by text or email when requested by the juror. The eJuror component of the system allows jurors to complete and submit a juror questionnaire, update personal information, verify when they need to report for jury service, request jury service excusals, postponements and deferrals, and provide documents for court review—all online. For those individuals who are unable to use the online system, the ability to submit a paper juror questionnaire and documents is still available.

Rollouts of the AgileJury system begin this month in the district court in Albany County and the circuit and district courts in Hot Springs County, Park County and Teton County. Rollouts to other courts around the state will continue throughout the year.

In conjunction with the launch of AgileJury, the random selection process that is used to compile the lists of potential jurors has been upgraded to include change of address information and removal of the names of deceased individuals. The jury pool lists are a compilation of data from Driver Services and Wyoming Voter Registration.
