On behalf of the Court Security Commission (Commission), enclosed is the 2025 Court Security Commission Annual Report.

As the number of reported incidents of courthouse violence increases across the nation, the Commission continues to make progress for safer Wyoming courts thanks to the efforts of the local court security management committees, county sheriffs, and court staff. The Commission's statutory mandate to protect life, property and the judicial process in the Wyoming court system is carried out by these dedicated individuals. This year, four courthouses in Wyoming received potentially contaminated mail.

In addition to the local efforts to improve court security, the Wyoming Judicial Branch applied for and received grant funding from the State Justice Institute to conduct courthouse security assessments. The Judicial Branch contracted with the National Center for State Courts to conduct security assessments in nine counties (Big Horn, Campbell, Crook, Hot Springs, Johnson, Park, Sheridan, Washakie, and Weston). The assessments not only provide expert information on the best practices for court security, but they raise awareness and keep a critical eye on the need for security improvements.

The Commission will continue its important work and stands ready to answer any questions that may arise.

The Wyoming Court Security Commission (Commission), established by W.S. § 5-11-101 et seq., continues its work to enhance court security in Wyoming courthouses by partnering with the Court Security Management Committees (local committees) established by Wyoming Court Security Standard 2009-1.

As one of its main objectives, the Commission focuses its efforts on increasing awareness of potential court security situations and risks associated with courthouses across the state. To address this objective, the Commission adopted Standard 2014-1, Incident Reporting. On January 1, 2015, courts in Wyoming began submitting incident reports for security issues happening in their courthouses. As of July 1, 2025, there have been 689 incident reports submitted. Over this past fiscal year, there were 66 incident reports submitted, which is a 49% decrease from the 130 reports submitted in the prior fiscal year, and a 40% decrease from the 109 reports submitted two years ago; however, it is right in line with the average of 66 reports per year submitted since the inception of incident reporting. The incidents reported during the fiscal year 2025 include the following types of security events:

- 16 Disorderly conduct reports;
- 7 Verbal threat reports;
- 5 Medical emergency reports;
- 1 Bomb threat report;
- 5 Written threat reports;
- 2 Physical Assault reports;
- 3 Attempts to bring in a firearm; and
- 27 Other reports of the following incident type: panic alarm activation; arrest/take into
 custody; suspicious package; trespassing; contempt of court; intelligence/officer safety;
 fire alarm activation; inmate self-abuse; court rule violations; suspicious letters; disorderly
 protest; suspicious circumstance; traffic accident.

Over this past year, the Wyoming Judiciary has experienced some serious security incidents. Incident reports reflect security staff stopping at least three attempts to bring firearms into secure court spaces, as well as several knives. Bullets were also found near a court clerk's counter. Courthouses also received bomb threats and, on several occasions, letters

containing white powder said to be anthrax. In addition, judges continue to be the target of threats. In one case, a litigant was found to be taking pictures and videotaping a judge and his vehicles. It was later discovered that the individual had pipe bombs and multiple weapons in his residence, which led to a federal indictment.

Based on the reports the Commission receives, there is every indication that courthouses present special challenges in terms of security. The stories told in the reports reflect the absolute need for a solid physical security presence in all courthouses across the state. In all the cases of a firearm or knife being detected by court security officers utilizing an X-Ray machine, one wonders what may have happened had that incident taken place in a courthouse with no regular court security presence.

To effectively address the security issues in Wyoming courthouses, a collective knowledge of these incidents and security events is imperative and emphasizes the importance of having adequate security in every courthouse. The incident reports provide an important tool for local court security committees in identifying what actions were effective in each incident and what security practices need to be improved.

Call to Order Justice John Fenn	Justice Fenn called the meeting to order, introduced the commission members, and welcomed all attendees.			
Court Security Assessments Ass	The Wyoming Judicial Branch, in coordination with the National Center for State Courts (NCSC), conducted court security assessments in nine counties (Big Horn, Campbell, Crook, Hot Springs, Johnson, Park, Sheridan, Washakie, and Weston. Representatives from the various counties participated in the Commission meeting. The NCSC proposed approximately 3.65 million dollars in security improvements (this figure did not include additional staffing recommendations). As a part of its ongoing work throughout the state, the Commission has been asked to make a recommendation to the Wyoming Judicial Council regarding any possible budgetary request for court security improvements in the nine counties. The Commission discussed the assessments and took comments from the county participants. Justice Fenn asked the nine counties to provide contact information for ongoing communications during the budgetary process.			
Funding Opportunities	Christine Emminger from Governor Gordon's Office gave a presentation on the WYGAP program. WYGAP is a technical assistance program, administered by the Wyoming Grants Management Office, designed to provide local governments and state agencies with support in identifying state and federal grants that support local initiatives. Christine discussed several grant programs and offered to help the nine counties pursue funding opportunities to accomplish the security improvements discussed in the NCSC assessments.			

George Nykun discussed the State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) grants that are administered through the Wyoming Office of Homeland Security. The SHSP grant is 100 percent federally funded and provides state and local governments monies based on Wyoming's homeland security strategies and priorities. For the past several years, SHSP monies have been granted to several counties for court security improvements. George encouraged the county participants to contact his office for more information and grant applications.

Incident Reports Summary Joe Hartigan

Joe Hartigan reported to the Commission that there have been a total 689 incident reports since the implementation of the report standard.

Joe provided the below list of reports since last meeting:

Disorderly Conduct – 16
Medical Emergency – 5
Bomb Threat – 1
Verbal Threat – 7
Written threat – 5
Physical Assault – 2
Drugs / contraband – 1
Attempt to bring in firearm – 3

Other – 27 (Other reports of the following incident type: panic alarm activation; arrest/take into custody; suspicious package; trespassing; contempt of court; intelligence/officer safety; fire alarm activation; inmate self-abuse; court rule violations; suspicious letters; disorderly protest; suspicious circumstance; traffic accident).

Joe also provided the Commission additional information on the four counties that received mailings with a powdery substance first thought to be Anthrax. Joe praised the counties for disseminating information quickly and complimented local law enforcement agencies for getting the information sent statewide, which greatly minimized the threat. No injuries or harm resulted from the incidents.

Legislative Update Justice Fenn	The Commission discussed HB172/HEA24 – Wyoming Repeal Gun Free Zones Act. The bill, which is attached to these minutes, allows the concealed carry of a gun in any meeting of a governmental entity and the Legislature or at a legislative committee meeting, public school and university, certain areas of public airports and any public building if not otherwise prohibited by law. It clarifies that the Legislature preempts the regulation of firearms and amends the existing preemption to generally prohibit state agencies and other political subdivisions from regulating firearms. It provides exceptions for private property, public school events where alcohol is served, certain health and human services facilities, facilities where explosive or volatile materials are present, facilities where carrying a gun is otherwise prohibited by law, and for students of an elementary or secondary school. This bill creates a misdemeanor offense for any person who knowingly prohibits entry to a person lawfully carrying a concealed weapon into a place where concealed carry is authorized. The bill also allows school districts to regulate concealed carry of employees and volunteers, including requiring training, and provides requirements for the allowance of concealed carry by employees and volunteers if the school district does not adopt related rules and regulations. The Commission discussed the legislation and agreed that the effect of this bill is a local issue to be handled by the shoriffs in each of the representive countries.
Courthouse Visits Justice Fenn	Justice Fenn and Joe Hartigan attended a court security training at the Rawlins Courthouse on June 4, 2025. The Rawlins local court security management committee conducts a court security scenario/drill every year to train employees on various court security issues. This year the drill involved receipt of contaminated mail.

AN ACT relating to concealed weapons; repealing gun free zones; providing for the carrying of concealed weapons as specified; creating a criminal offense for prohibiting entry to a person carrying a concealed weapon as specified; clarifying that only the state legislature may regulate firearms, weapons and ammunition; providing for exceptions; requiring rulemaking; and providing for an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

Section 1. W.S. 6-8-105 is created to read:

6-8-105. Exceptions for state issued concealed carry permits; penalty.

- (a) This section shall be known as and may be cited as the "Wyoming Repeal Gun Free Zones Act."
- (b) Persons lawfully carrying concealed weapons in Wyoming under W.S. 6-8-104(a)(ii) through (iv) may carry a concealed weapon in the following places:
 - (i) Any meeting of a governmental entity;
- (ii) Any meeting of the legislature or a committee thereof;
- (iii) Any public airport in areas of the airport where the carrying of concealed weapons is not prohibited or restricted under federal law or federal regulation;
- (iv) Any public building not otherwise prohibited under W.S. 6-8-104(t) or regulated under this section.

- (c) Subject to W.S. 6-8-104(t) (ix) and subsection (f) of this section, persons lawfully carrying concealed weapons in Wyoming with a permit issued under W.S. 6-8-104(a) (ii) may carry a concealed weapon in the following places:
- (i) Any public school, public college or university athletic event taking place on public property that does not sell alcoholic beverages;
- (ii) Any public elementary or secondary school
 facility;
 - (iii) Any public college or university facility.
 - (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to:
- (i) Allow the carrying of a concealed weapon where otherwise prohibited under W.S. 6-8-104(t);
- (ii) Prohibit a private property owner from restricting firearms on his private property;
- (iii) Prohibit a governmental entity from prohibiting the open carry, display or wearing of a firearm in its facilities or on its campus;
- (iv) Allow the carrying of a concealed weapon into facilities where otherwise prohibited by law;
- (v) Allow the carrying of a concealed weapon within state agency operated health and human services settings, health and human services facilities that are exempt from licensure or licensed by the department of family services or department of corrections or health and

human services facilities that are certified by the behavioral health division of the department of health to provide residential services;

- (vi) Allow the carrying of a concealed weapon within any facility where explosive or volatile materials are present. For purposes of this paragraph "explosive or volatile materials" shall not include materials that are either in an insufficient amount or in a form such that the material could not reasonably cause serious bodily injury due to the materials explosive or volatile nature;
- (vii) Prohibit a governmental entity from requiring any employee or student to store firearms within a concealed biometric container or a lock box within the employee's or student's direct control at all times when the firearms are not being carried on the employee's or student's person, except said rules shall not:
- (A) Prohibit the storage of firearms and ammunition in public campus housing by any employee or student authorized to carry a concealed firearm pursuant to this section; or
- (B) Require that a firearm be stored unloaded or separate from its ammunition.
- (e) Any person who knowingly prohibits entry to another person for lawfully carrying a concealed weapon into a place authorized pursuant to subsection (b) or (c) of this section, unless otherwise prohibited under subsection (d) of this section, when the person would otherwise be permitted entry is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for not more than one (1) year,

a fine of not more than two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00), or both.

- (f) The board of trustees in each school district may adopt rules and regulations to govern employees and volunteers lawfully carrying concealed weapons in Wyoming under W.S. 6-8-104 on or in any property or facility owned or leased by the school district. If no rules and regulations are adopted under this subsection, an employee or a volunteer with a permit to conceal carry under W.S. 6-8-104(a) (ii) may carry a concealed weapon under W.S. 6-8-105(c) (ii) or (iii) onto school property. Any rules and regulations adopted under this subsection shall only apply to persons who are volunteers or employees, as defined by subsection (g) of this section. The rules under this subsection shall:
- (i) Require any person carrying a firearm pursuant to this section to maintain the firearm on his person at all times or in a concealed biometric container or lock box within the direct control of the person at all times;
- (ii) Establish ongoing training requirements, curricula and instructor qualifications, in consultation with local law enforcement, including:
- (A) An initial course of training comprised of not less than sixteen (16) hours of live fire handgun training, and eight (8) hours of scenario based training using nonlethal training, firearms and ammunition; and
- (B) Annual firearm qualification and documented recurrent training of not less than twelve (12) hours with an approved instructor.

- (g) For purposes of subsection (f) of this section, "employee" means any person employed by a school district, including but not limited to, superintendents, assistant superintendents, principals, assistant principals, teachers, guidance counselors, librarians, teacher's aids, coaches, business managers, secretaries or administrative assistants, janitors, bus drivers or other employees of a school district.
- (h) For purposes of this section, "governmental entity" means the state, the university of Wyoming and any local government as defined by W.S. 1-39-103(a)(ii).
- (j) The board of trustees in any school district may waive all or part of the training requirements of paragraph (f)(ii) of this section for isolated rural schools and employees in those schools.
- **Section 2.** W.S. 6-8-104(t)(ix) and 6-8-401(c) are amended to read:

6-8-104. Wearing or carrying concealed weapons; penalties; exceptions; permits.

- (t) No person authorized to carry a concealed weapon pursuant to paragraphs (a)(ii) through (iv) of this section shall carry a concealed firearm into:
- (ix) Any elementary or secondary school facility, except as provided in W.S. 21-3-132 if the person is enrolled as a student at any elementary or secondary school;

6-8-401. Firearm, weapon and ammunition regulation and prohibition by state.

(c) The sale, transfer, purchase, delivery, taxation, manufacture, ownership, transportation, storage, use and possession of firearms, weapons and ammunition shall be authorized, regulated and prohibited by the state, and regulation thereof is preempted by the legislature of the state of Wyoming. Except as authorized by 15-1-103 (a) (xviii) and 21-3-132-23-1-302, no state agency, city, town, county, political subdivision or any other entity shall authorize, regulate or prohibit the sale, transfer, purchase, delivery, taxation, manufacture, ownership, transportation, storage, carrying use, possession of firearms, weapons, accessories, components or ammunition except as specifically provided by this chapter. This section shall not affect zoning or other ordinances which encompass firearms businesses along with businesses. Zoning and other ordinances which are designed for the purpose of restricting or prohibiting the sale, purchase, transfer or manufacture of firearms or ammunition as a method of regulating firearms or ammunition are in conflict with this section and are prohibited.

Section 3. W.S. 6-8-104(t)(iv) through (vi) and (x) and 21-3-132 are repealed.

Section 4. The state building commission shall begin promulgating any rules necessary to administer this act not later than thirty (30) days after the effective date of this act.
