**Question 4:**

What case types are within the scope of this RFI (example, civil criminal, traffic, family)? All case types are within scope of this RFI. Those include civil, juvenile, traffic, family, probate, criminal, etc.

**Question 5:**

Please provide annual estimates in count and/or size (e.g. megabyte, terabyte, etc.) for both the number of multimedia files submitted and the total number of pages filed. The WJB estimates approximately two thousand five hundred (2,500) evidence submissions to the trial courts annually.

The WJB does not currently maintain a centralized digital evidence management system and does not directly receive, store, or manage multimedia evidence files. As a result, the WJB does not have historical metrics regarding the annual number of multimedia files submitted or the total storage volume associated with those files.

**Question 6:**

What is the typical internet bandwidth available in each courtroom. Internet connectivity varies by location, with courthouse bandwidth ranging from approximately 100 Mbps at smaller rural locations to 1 Gbps or greater at larger facilities. Courtrooms utilize the courthouse network and share available bandwidth with other users and systems within the facility.

**Question 7:**

What is the existing courtroom set-up (i.e. internet connections, Wi-Fi, presentation hardware like monitors, projectors, and screens for judges, clerks, lawyers, and/or jury). Courtrooms are equipped with integrated evidence presentation systems that support multiple input sources for court participants and court staff.

Evidence and presentation content can be displayed simultaneously on multiple monitors located throughout the courtroom. Depending on the courtroom configuration, displays are provided for the judge, clerk, witness stand, attorney tables, jury box, and gallery/public viewing areas. This allows all participants to view the same content during proceedings while maintaining a consistent presentation experience throughout the courtroom.

Wireless connectivity is available within court facilities, and limited wired network connectivity may be available within the courtroom, primarily in and around the attorney/bar area. The number and location of available Ethernet connections vary by courtroom. Vendors should assume that Wi-Fi connectivity will be available, but should not assume dedicated wired network connections at every participant location.

Specific display sizes, quantities, room layouts, and network connectivity options may vary by location, but the overall presentation functionality is generally consistent across courtrooms.

**Question 8:**

Will all courts be required to use the EEMS system adopted by the state? Who will be responsible for seeking a court's participation in using the EEMS? Will participating courts be required to use the EEMS for all case types?

Ideally, all court will use the EEMS. However, the Judicial Branch recognizes the importance of allowing courts, and stakeholders adequate time to become familiar and comfortable with the new processes. Accordingly, there will be a defined integration and transition period during which training, onboarding, and support resources will be provided.
